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The Practice of Iconography

Hartford — The Clare Gallery is pleased to present *The Practice of Iconography*. This exhibition is free and open to the public and extends from February 9th to April 12th, 2012. A reception and artist lecture will be held on Thursday, March 1st, 2012 from 5:30–7:30 p.m. where iconographer Marek Czarnecki and his students will discuss the fundamental meaning of iconography; their history and holy traditions; and their historical materials and techniques, which have been used for centuries. Please join us for this in-depth exploration into the beauty and depth of icons.

For ten years, Meriden iconographer Marek Czarnecki has been teaching a small, dedicated group of local students to paint, or more properly said "write," traditional icons in a historical technique and style. Working from Russian, Greek, Byzantine, Serbian and contemporary prototypes, this local circle of iconographers practices and preserves an important artistic and dogmatic patrimony, which belongs to the universal church, east and west.

Representing diverse ethnic, cultural and denominational backgrounds, these icons reflect the personal piety of their makers, as well as the needs of their respective spiritual communities. Icons are not a simple style of religious art; rather, they present us with a whole vision of reality that uses art as its tool. Icons open a window into the transfigured world where spirit and matter are interconnected. To articulate the invisible world of the spirit, icons use a very careful language of signs, symbols, ideal order and beauty, yet they can never lapse into the abstract or purely allegorical.
