The Paston's Corner

January 16, 2022

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Four words no Franciscan Friar wants to hear: "They have no wine." Such is the setting for today's Gospel account about the wedding at Cana and the first of Jesus' miracles or "signs."

Then, as now, weddings could be complicated affairs, often taking place over the course of several days. Autumn was considered to be the best time for weddings because the harvest was over and people could relax and enjoy each other's company. The evenings were cool and it was comfortable to party well into the late hours. Typically, the entire village gathered for the wedding.

At some point the unthinkable happened: the wine had run out and the prospect of the new couple suffering an acute embarrassment was imminent. Until Mary stepped in and mentioned quietly to her Son that the wine had run out. Although the Gospel writer makes much of this extraordinary event in order to stress Jesus' divine nature, I prefer to think of it as a quick and unassuming solution to a potential problem. I doubt that anyone other than Jesus and Mary were aware of what just happened. Jesus' first miracle as recorded by John was also his most private and practical one.

But for later generations, this event was a sign that triggered a new messianic age of abundance and grace. Think back to the prophecy in the 25th chapter of Isaiah: "On this mountain the Lord of hosts will provide for all peoples a feast of rich food and choice wines, juicy, rich food and pure, choice wines." The coming of the Lord as Messiah would be symbolized by an abundance of food, drink and great rejoicing; and a wedding banquet is the perfect example for that feast.



Having concluded our celebration of Christmas, we now enter a period known as Winter Ordinary Time. It's good for us to be reminded of the

Lord's abiding presence in the feast we take part in every Sunday. Although COVID has placed necessary limitations on our liturgical feast, let us nevertheless always find joy in the Eucharist we share, and with patience, await a time when we can gather again in the fullness of the Eucharistic banquet in which we glimpse the glory of the kingdom of heaven.

Now, let's talk about Ordinary Time, which is often so misunderstood and underestimated. There are five major seasons of the Church's liturgical year: Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter and Ordinary Time. The Paschal Triduum is a short interval between the end of Lent and the beginning of the Great Fifty Days of Easter.

Ordinary Time is divided into two periods: winter (after Christmas and before Lent) and summer/autumn (after Easter until the start of Advent and the next liturgical year). For more than half the year, we celebrate the passing of time which is anything but ordinary! It's also helpful to remember that "ordinary" in the liturgical sense doesn't mean dull or routine. Its true meaning derives from the use of "ordinal" numbers which indicate the various weeks: first, second, third, and so on.

This year there will be eight Sundays of Ordinary Time before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday, March 2nd. On Monday, June 6, we will resume Ordinary Time at the tenth week.

So, during these two periods, let us make Ordinary Time extraordinary by deepening our commitment to Jesus and how we can live out our faith on a day-to-day basis. The Gospel of Luke, probably my favorite, is filled with stories about "ordinary" people whose lives were changed by encounters with Jesus, whose parables gave his hearers a deeper understanding of their relationship with him. Let's try to hear them again with ears and hearts open to new possibilities.

Sister Parish: A Reflection

Parishioner, Bill Prenetta traveled to Haiti back in 2005 and offers this wonderful reflection on his trip.

When I first traveled to Zoranje in 2005, my initial impres-

sions of the adults of the village were that they were unsure of our intentions with the covenant, and thus tentative in their behavior. On the con-



trary, the children were friendly and curious about their strange visitors. Most vividly were my memories of the hardworking teachers and children in the church school, who had limited supplies and no textbooks. Ultimately, I remembered that life in Zoranje was difficult, but the people had a true respect for community, family, and spiritual life. Since that first visit, I traveled to Zoranje several times; and, due to our covenant, enormous positive changes occurred. The biggest change was in our reception by the community. At first, we were respected guests. Now, we were welcomed as family. We no longer sat across from one another but with one another sharing our joys, sorrows, fears, and dreams. Most often we shared the gift of laughter. We also all used the Creole expression, Zanmi m, which means "My Friend." Our Covenant certainly helps to make life more prosperous in Zoranje. Yet, I often wonder if the opposite is actually true. Have the people of Zoranje actually helped us more than we have helped them? An expression I heard on my last trip seems to sum up what I believe comes out of our Covenant; which simply stated is, "We are the people of Haiti's hope, but they are our salvation."

Over the past few weeks you have heard from those who have traveled to St. Genevieve. You have heard how the covenant has changed them and our parish, and how the covenant has changed the children of St. Genevieve School and, as a result, the surrounding community.

As we approach our celebration of the Feast of St. Genevieve on January 30, 2022, we will again consider renewing this convenant. What do you think?

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
