## Clare Gallery new exhibit Creativity in the Time of Covid

Hartford, CT — The Clare Gallery presents a timely new exhibition *Creativity in the Time of Covid*. We have been dealing with a worldwide Covid-19 pandemic since January 2020. Social distancing, quarantining, masks, vaccinations, boosters, testing, restrictions, remote school, remote work, remote experiences, and business closures have become the "new normal" for nearly two years. This pandemic has affected our various communities in a multitude of ways.

Some of us have dealt with grief, some isolation, some have experienced increased anxiety. Others have had a surge in creativity and energy throwing ourselves into new tasks to learn or explore something new and challenging with our time.
