The Paston's Corner

February 13, 2022

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

This week's letter is going to be a short lesson in art history. For the cover of today's bulletin I have chosen a folio from an unnamed Psalter which illustrates Psalm One in Latin. This is the Responsorial Psalm for today's Mass for the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time. It begins: Beatus vir, qui non abiit in consilio impiorum, et in via peccatorum non stetit, et in cathedra pestilentiæ non sedit. Sed in lege Domini voluntas eius, et in lege eius meditabitur die ac nocte. "Blessed the man who follows not the counsel of the wicked, nor walks in the way of sinners, nor sits in the company of the insolent, but delights in the law of the Lord and meditates on his law day and night."

If you have difficulty making out the words of the psalm, you're not alone! When I first started studying illuminated manuscripts, it took me a while to learn how to decipher the medieval lettering, especially the various types of abbreviations the scribes used in the text. But once you get used to it, it's not difficult. I read the entire Psalter once, and it helped to have a Latin-English translation beside me.

In medieval illuminated Psalters, the beginning of the book of Psalms was often elaborately illustrated with a large capital B that started the word Beatus. In some cases, the B filled almost an entire page, with the rest of the word "eatus" in very small letters. Then the remainder of the psalm continued on a facing page. These

became known as Beatus Initials, and the artists who painted them often used a great deal of creativity, as shown in examples below.

These two versions of the Beatus Initial are referred to as "inhabited

initials" because the artist filled in the large round openings of the letter B with people. The example at the bottom of the page is from the Ingeborg Psalter, created in the late 12th Century for Princess Ingeborg, wife of King Philip II August of France. The upper part of the B shows an angel sending the prophet Samuel to anoint David as king of Israel. In the bottom part of the B, Samuel pours oil upon

the head of David (cf. 1 Samuel 16).

The Beatus Initial on the right comes from the Breslau Psalter, made for the ducal court of Silesia around 1265 by an Italian book illuminator from Padua, the Master of Giovanni da Gaibana. It shows God the Father in the upper field, surrounded by two angels; the lower field



shows Christ, flanked by his mother Mary and John the Baptist. Round medallions show the dove of the Holy Spirit in the center, while on the left we see King David with a psaltery, and on the right King Solomon and the Prophet Isaiah.

Going back to the folio on the cover of the bulletin, you will notice images of St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi in the lower left and right, respectively; and the symbol of the Holy Name of Jesus between them. This leads me to believe that it is from a Franciscan Psalter, probably made in Italy in the 13th or 14th century. The inhabited Beatus Initial also shows King David playing the psaltery.

As we pray Psalm One at Mass this weekend, let us strive to be "like a tree planted near running water," yielding fruit in due season, so that whatever we do, we prosper because our lives our grounded in faith and hope, lived out in charity and justice. Class dismissed!

the people of Zorange.


















