The Pastor's Corner

February 6, 2022

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

It might strike us as rather odd that Jesus would just hop into a fishing boat and ask the owner to row out a bit from the shore so that he could preach to the crowds along the shoreline. But Simon didn't seem to mind, nor did he argue with Jesus when he told Simon and his fishing companions to put their nets out into deep water even when they had failed to catch anything the night before. We also have to remember what occurred earlier in Luke's Gospel and how Jesus had healed Simon's mother-in-law from a severe fever. Maybe Simon was thinking to himself: "I'd better do what this guy says."


Sure enough, the catch of fish is so tremendous that their nets are at the breaking point. Their doubting and questioning come to a miraculous resolution, and after bringing the boats to shore, they leave them there as empty reminders that their fishing days are over — or were they?


At the close of the Great Jubilee Year of 2000, Saint John Paul II issued an Apostolic Letter in which he quoted this section of Luke's Gospel. "Put out into the deep" — "Duc in altum!" the Holy Father exclaimed. By highlighting this short phrase, John Paul issued a challenge to the church at the turn of the millennium to reach

out farther in order to bring the Good News to the world. We hardly need reminding that the past two decades have brought more heartache, death





The world needs to hear a word of healing amidst the hatred and bloodshed we encounter daily, both here and abroad. All of us must ask ourselves how we might be instruments of peace, healing and reconciliation in our world today. Perhaps it means that we must go deeper or farther than we think we are capable. Maybe it means stepping out of our comfort zones to do something more radical, more courageous, more, well... Christian than we're accustomed to. As St. Francis said on his deathbed: "I have done what was mine to do. May Christ teach you what is yours."

All of today's readings highlight the fact that those who were called by God — Isaiah, Paul, and the fishermen (Simon Peter, James and John) — all thought themselves to be unworthy of the call they received. Yet they were still called to important tasks as a prophet, an apostle, and as fishers of people. Likewise, all of us are called, despite our less-than-perfect records, to be witnesses to the Gospel and to be the Lord's presence in the world around us. Moreover, he may even be calling some to be priests or consecrated religious in service to the Church. So I would ask our young people especially: Might the Lord be calling you to the Priesthood or Religious Life? Give it some thought and pray about it.

Parishioner Francis Rago, visited Haiti for the first time in October of 2014. Having retired from teaching, he was particularly interested in observing the classes as they were being taught. While Fran didn't speak or understand any Haitian Creole, he was an astute observer. This reflection was written following the 2014 visit.



"In the fall of 2014, I found the people of St. Genevieve parish to be, without exception, very warm and welcoming. They also seemed very devout, as their daily mass

was well-attended. But it was the children who really charmed me. I observed every grade, and saw that they were like children everywhere -- bright-eyed and eager

learners, full of energy and curiosity. My only sadness was watching the dedicated teachers having to teach in such primitive conditions."
