

The Pastor's Corner

December 25, 2022

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

For the hit Christmas movie "Home Alone," John Williams wrote a song called "Walking Home" with lyrics by Leslie Bricusse. The chorus of the song says, "Somewhere in my memory / Christmas joys all around me / Living in my memory / All of the music, all of the magic / All of the family, home here with me."

Christmas is indeed a moment full of memories from childhood to old age. We remember all those funny, sad, or surprising moments that we recall in old photos or VHS tapes — like the ones I'm sharing here. The first photo is me at about 15 months, sitting in front of a cardboard Santa with a fiberglass beard. Even at that tender age I wondered how Santa could come down the chimney since it was a fake fireplace! Apparently



my parents had to leave the back door unlocked so Santa could make his entrance. The second photo is me at four-years-old, sitting on Santa's



lap at AM&A's, a venerable department store in downtown Buffalo which, like Sage-Allen here in Hartford, is now a thing of memory.

The final photo requires a bit of explanation. Somewhere around 9 or 10 years of age, I started to develop my passion for the organ. When I was in sixth grade, I received my first organ

- a small table-top Magnus chord organ; the kind that had buttons on the left side to play chords while the melody was played with the right

hand. Unfortunately, my curiosity had gotten the better of me and, after a bit of snooping in the basement before Christmas, I discovered the box. So it wasn't such a big surprise when I saw it on Christmas morning.

The bigger surprise happened when I was 14 and my parents gave me a Hammond organ for Christmas. I had been dropping not-so-subtle hints to them, but never really thought they



would spring for such an extravagant gift. But the Saturday before Christmas in 1968, I was in our basement working on a school project (building a model of a Greek amphitheater), and my brother and I heard a bit of commotion from upstairs. He looked out the window and saw a delivery truck parked at the curb and said,



"I think they're delivering an organ." I replied, "Yeah, sure" and went back to my project. Several minutes later, my mother called down the stairs for me to come up to the living room for a minute. When I walked into the room my father snapped the photo shown here – me with a look of complete astonishment at seeing a beautiful Hammond spinet organ in the corner of the living room! To say the least, my project in the basement was forgotten for several days as I played my heart out on that organ.

When we think of the birth of Jesus in a stable at Bethlehem, I wonder how big of a surprise it was to those who witnessed it. Luke gives us a bit of a hint when he recounts how the shepherds, having been greeted by a host of angels singing "Glory to God in the highest," made their way to the stable: "And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger. And when they saw it, that made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them" (Lk 2:16-18). Then we are told that "Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart."

I imagine that the real surprise didn't come until some 30 years later with Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection from the dead. But the big surprise of Christmas is that God would become incarnate in the world. This Emmanuel, God-with-us, had become one of us, and through his teachings and miracles, led from one surprise to another. God really cares about us, and God has never stopped caring about us! All of this is pure, extravagant gift! Are you surprised about this? As people of faith we shouldn't be, but sometimes it is hard to believe that God would do such a thing.

The ancient hymn, *O magnum mysterium*, beautifully captures this element of surprise. Part of it reads: "O great mystery, and wonderful sacrament, that animals should see the newborn Lord, lying in a manger!" To the animals, and even more so, the shepherds, and eventually to the whole world, God's Incarnation of Jesus is still a great, mysterious surprise to those who choose to believe it.

A Christmas Message from St. Genevieve to the Parishioners at St. Patrick-St. Anthony Church

As we celebrate the birth of our savior, along with our Sister Parish of St. Genevieve, in Haiti, we share Pastor Gaby Noels' Christmas message to us. His is a moving message of hope, gratitude and good wishes for us, despite the continuing grim situation in Haiti.

We continue our Christmas Giving Tree appeal for support for the parish school, particularly for workbooks and tuition assistance through January 15, 2023.

English: To our dear sister parish St. Patrick St Anthony:

As Saint Paul says, "We do not place our hope in Christ for this life only; If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are the most pitiable people of all. Instead, we put our hope in Christ for a new life, that of the risen Christ where we will be with him in glory". Our hope is based first of all on what Jesus tells us: "I am the Resurrection and the Life. He who believes in me, although dead, shall live".

Then on the vision of glory of the book of the Apocalypse of Saint John (7,2-4.9-14), which the church offers in the solemnity of all the Saints to invite us to live in the hope of renewal beyond death. We experience life as it is today in Haiti because the world does not know us, because the world does not know God. We accept to "suffer with Christ so that we may also be glorified with him" (Rom 8, 14-17).

Dear Brothers and Sisters of Ste.-Geneviève Parish,

As we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus at Christmas, I am mindful of the fact that Mary and Joseph faced many moments of fear and danger. Shortly after the angel told Mary that she would become pregnant with a child through the power of the Holy Spirit, Joseph had to come to terms with a potentially embarrassing scandal. When it was time for Mary to give birth, she and Joseph had to suddenly leave Nazareth and travel by foot to Bethlehem to be counted in the Emperor's census. Worst of all, once word got out that King Herod wanted to kill the infant Jesus, they had to rush to safety in Egypt.

In light of all that the Holy Family had to cope with, we, your brothers and sister of St. Patrick-St. Anthony Church in Hartford, offer you our prayers and support during a time of great danger and uncertainty in your country of Haiti. We wish to offer you as much assistance as you need in order to live in peace and security. However, we must also leave much in the hands of God who is our refuge and strength. May God, who experienced the same vulnerability as a human baby, grant you comfort and joy as we celebrate his birth. All of you are very much a part of our parish life. We enjoyed a wonderful visit with Father Dominique back in August, and we have had a brief video conference with Father Gaby. They are very dedicated priests who serve you with selfless devotion.

DID YOU KNOW ...

In the early church communities, very

often the people themselves were responsible for choosing their leaders. Henry Chadwick, a renowned historical expert on the early church, writes that in choosing someone for the position that eventually became known as bishop, "...the actual choice of the candidate rested with the whole congregation, clergy and people together." He also added that "Election by the people likewise played a large part in the ordination of presbyters and deacons." So, in the history of the church, the Spirit has worked through the people of God to raise up those to serve in positions of leadership.

Perhaps one of the most famous church leaders to be chosen by acclamation was St. Ambrose of Milan, who was serving as a government official when the Bishop of Milan died. As Ambrose, who was well-known as a respected official and speaker entered the cathedral where deliberations were taking place, everyone shouted "Ambrose for Bishop!" Though hesitant at first, he accepted and was ordained a priest, and consecrated as bishop all in one day. He went on to become a well-loved and respected leader and has been named one of the Doctors of the Church.



It wasn't until the Second Vatican Council in the 1960s, that the people were again acknowledged as Spirit-filled members of the Body of Christ, capable of recognizing the gifts within their community. Lumen Gentium, one of the major Council documents, states that "the entire body of the faithful, anointed as they are by the

Holy One... manifest this special property by means of the whole peoples' supernatural discernment in matters of faith..." To expand on their responsibilities it states further, "the Holy Spirit sanctifies and leads the people of God allotting gifts to everyone...distributes special graces among the faithful of every rank...which makes them fit to undertake the various tasks and offices which contribute to the renewal and building up of the church."


