This week we continue our presentations on vocations with a reflection by Kathy Swift, a Mercy Associate.

God, what do you want me to do with my life? "Is it I, Lord?" a line from a favorite hymn, *Here I am, Lord*, is the discernment question I posed when seeking a vocation. I envied the burning bush that God sent

Moses and the direct line to God's voice Noah had. Why didn't I get a clear sign from God?

God sends signs, but I need to be attentive to interpret them. How to answer, "God, what do you want me to do with my life"?

I believe vocations are discovered by feeling as much as thinking. As an English teacher, I seek similes to clarify how to explain how I knew when I had found my vocation. The cliché of the key in the lock springs to mind. The pieces of my life fit together and an opening occurs. I also liken it to when I sing and the note I project is the exact one written by the composer and it resonates in my ears and heart.

My introduction to Mercy Association resonated in this heart-way when I heard from the charismatic director Sister Grace Mannion the origins and specifics of this vocation option birthed in 1968. As someone who was attracted to religious life but felt unworthy, I harmonized with this call to association. Through the structure of our covenant, I outline what I would do in prayer, ministry and community. Through the year-long orientation/discernment, Sister Grace assured me and the others considering becoming Mercy associates, it didn't necessarily mean adding to what I was currently doing, but I would do it with the lens of Mercy.

By saying yes to becoming an associate, my teaching became consciously infused with the charism of Mercy. No, I didn't become a soft-touch teacher who allowed students to do whatever they wanted, but I did listen to what they said they needed and sifted through responses that affirmed them and kept standards.

I was more deliberate about daily prayer and pursued spiritual direction which was life changing having a talented guide to interpret God's signs with wisdom.

In the life-giving Mercy community I joined as an associate, we celebrate and minister together. We make collective and personal efforts tied to Mercy Critical concerns: racism, immigration, nonviolence, women, and the earth. I learn from emails from the Justice Committee with model letters to government officials that make me a more active citizen. We signed position statements to end the death penalty and conserve water. We hosted seminars on human trafficking and how to help and hold drives for clothing, baby items, and household items to help immigrants, pregnant women and victims of domestic violence respectively.

"God, what do you want me to do with my life?" to bring Mercy wherever I am. Knowing I had discovered which gift of the Holy Spirit I was graced with, how can I keep from singing?

Vocation Reflection

Being a vowed woman religious is a lifelong commitment; I am a religious who is retired from formal ministry, not retired from my religious profession! In her talk to a Parish for the Annual Appeal for the Retirement Fund for Religious, one of our Sisters said, "we don't retire, we expire!"

A product of public-school education, I met the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur at Emmanuel College in Boston. I graduated in 1967, taught a year in a public school and entered the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur in 1968 post Vatican II. We kept our Baptismal names as religious life was now seen as a continuation of the Baptismal Call, not something added to it. We were encouraged to dress like the people, thus no black habit. Our "habit" was/is our distinctive Notre Dame Cross, with ND in the middle, signifying Mary's standing at the foot of the cross, reminding us that our Congregation was founded on the Cross. Mary's place at the foot of the cross speaks to my heart whenever the media shows a woman mourning the death of her child. The "Ah, Qu'il est bon, le bon dieu!" (how Good is the Good God!) inscribed on the back of our cross, expresses our Charism to proclaim the goodness of God.

We wrote our own formula for profession of vows, and in 1971, mine ended with "May I incarnate in my daily life your redemptive love for all men." (At that time, inclusivity was not in my vocabulary!) As life went on, my response to my vocational call led me from formal classroom education in Massachusetts to ministry in Connecticut: to refugees, to the hospitalized, to Notre Dame Mission Volunteers and their service in non-profit agencies. 1990 brought me not only to CT, but also to this Parish! If written now, my ending vow statement prayer would be "May I see Jesus incarnate in every person I meet."

As a Sister of Notre Dame de Namur, I have had many opportunities for spiritual input, study and prayer. With advancing age, physical activity decreases, but opportunities for advocacy increase. I realize how being a religious compels me to be an active citizen, continuing to become aware of and find ways to respond to human needs resulting from unjust policies and systems. My prayer has become more contemplative and is enriched by liturgy and the daily reflections from both the Abbey of the Arts and Richard Rohr's Center of Action and Contemplation.

Not yet ready to "expire," I wonder where God will be leading me next!

More students have meant more meals and likewise more, better paid, teachers. We have supported the community by expanding our support in response to this growth. Further, we have identified the need for new books, fixed the parish truck, and recently agreed with Fr. Gaby to directly help support basic care for several of the most in need within his parish. The world changes... as we know, Haiti has been no exception.

Your continued support of our Sister Parish Committee's work is to allow us to align our best intentions with the expanding needs of our brothers and sisters at St. Genevieve. This support has been nothing short of miraculous. Where there has been a need, we ask, and our parish has responded – with open hands and open hearts.

This year as we embark on our one and only fundraiser of the year, Christmas in July, the Sister Parish Committee hopes that with your generous support we are able to remain in a position to answer the needs of the St. Genevieve Parish. We look to maintain our commitment to the school through a hot lunch program and fair-wage teacher salaries. However, we also know that in good faith, we may be asked to do more.

Community healthcare has been on the agenda at our meetings now. What is the most basic human right for simple health services, and what should and might be done to assure this. In the age of pandemic, cholera and covid are both addressable and reasonable to avoid, but not without any healthcare. What can and should we look to do in this area? We will continue to pursue and share with our parish our findings and thoughts on addressing this imminent concern.

What the future holds for Haiti is unclear. But with the help of the St Patrick St Anthony parishioners, we stand ready to honor our pledge to be in Covenant, through any calamity, with our Haitian family. Thank you for your support of the Sister Parish Committee's work in our Christmas in July Annual Fundraising Campaign.

Catholic Diocese of Pathanamthitta Mission Appeal

The Catholic diocese of Pathanamthitta was established in March 2010 and it is one of the newest dioceses in the church. It lies at the southernmost part of India. As we are in the initial stage, we are making every effort to build this diocese up both spiritually and temporally. We try to give the gospel of our Lord to the 45,000 faithful of the diocese and 1,500,000 inhabitants of the county of Pathanamthitta. The diocese currently has hundred parish/mission stations and 120 priests.

- One of the most urgent needs of the diocese is to promote vocations to priesthood and religious life which will in turn contribute to the overall development of the region. The diocese has to meet all the expenses of seminarians during their formation as most of their families are not in a position to do so.

- Special attention for the well-being and care of the marginalized of the society. Homes run by the diocese for the mentally challenged and a home for the physically challenged help the downtrodden from the area by giving them hope and showing them mercy.

- Our diocese, through the churches and organizations, is helping the people with food, medical care and other needs. Through the social service society, the diocese tries to help many people who are economically, socially and educationally down.

- Diocese intended to provide houses conducive for living to everyone residing within the territory of the Diocese of Pathanamthitta. The project has three Schemes: 1. Help for Renovation: where considerable financial aid will be given for the renovation of the house; 2. Support to those who have land and no house: give the neediest assistance to construct a new house; 3. Support to those who have no land and no house: give the neediest assistance to construct both land and house.

We envision, the return of the mission preaching, to be used for supporting the seminary formation of our candidates for priesthood and for helping the poor people in our area. Whatever financial support you could extend to this cause will be deeply appreciated.
