The Pastor's Corner

November 3, 2024

Dear Parishioners and Friends,



In a closing gesture of the Synod in Rome, on October 24, Pope Francis issued a new encyclical letter, his fourth, titled *Dilexit Nos* ("He loved us"). In this document, Pope Francis reminds us of how devotion to the Sacred Heart is a profound expression of faith, and an encounter with the unending love of God. I wish to share some comments about the encyclical published online by the Catholic Agency for Overseas Development.

The document is part of ongoing celebrations marking the 350th anniversary of the first apparition of the Sacred Heart of Jesus to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque. The celebrations began on 27 December 2023, the anniversary, and are scheduled to end on the feast of the Sacred Heart, 27 June 2025.

The Sacred Heart represents the love of Jesus as both fully human and fully divine. Although it has Biblical and early Christian roots, it became a widespread and popular devotion after 1673, due to the visions of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque. Christ appeared to the French nun four times, showing her his heart and affirming his love for all people.

Pope Francis believes that devotion to the Sacred Heart has the power to "illuminate the path of ecclesial renewal, but also to say something significant to a world that seems to have lost its heart."

Pope Francis has frequently talked about the importance of encounter. In *Dilexit Nos*, he explains how our lifestyle today, with its frenetic pace and its emphasis on consumerism, means that we are not paying enough attention to the heart. He returns to his theme of the dangers of individualism, telling us that this stops us from having a true encounter with our neighbor. This leads to the realization that an authentic personal relationship to Christ, strengthened by devotion to the Sacred Heart, cannot be separated from loving our neighbor.

Pope Francis particularly mentions the need for us to work for unity and peace in our world – a unity and peace that can only be brought about by love. He condemns the complicity, tolerance or indifference of other countries during the outbreak of new wars and speaks powerfully of the effect of conflict on the human person,

evoking the image of elderly women who have lost their homes and are forced to mourn for their children and grandchildren.

Pope Francis also reiterates his call for us to care for our common home, saying: "For it is by drinking of [Christ's] love that we become capable of forging bonds of fraternity, of recognizing the dignity of each human being and, of working together to care for our common home." (#217)

We are reminded that God's love for us is never-ending and that, filled with this love, we are also called to share it with others, when he says: "We need once more to take up the word of God and to realize, in doing so, that our best response to the love of Christ's heart is to love our brothers and sisters." (#167)

Pope Francis' new letter speaks to our hearts, reminding us that it is in Christ's heart that "we truly come at last to know ourselves and we learn to love" (#30). As we approach the 2025 Jubilee Year, we can find renewed hope that "amid the devastation wrought by evil, the heart of Christ desires that we cooperate with him in restoring goodness and beauty to our world." (#182)

The pope previously expressed his hope that the document will "illuminate the path of ecclesial renewal" and speaks here of the Church needing the "gratuitous love of God that liberates, enlivens, brings joy to the heart and builds communities" (#219).

In the light of this encyclical's invitation to respond to the love of Christ's heart by loving our brothers and sisters, we can make manifest the love of Jesus in the world.

Clare Gallery's New exhibit: Divine Cosmos

Connecticut artist, Jill Harrington Nichols closes the Clare Gallery's 2024 season, focusing on the environment, with *Divine Cosmos*. The exhibition celebrates the heart, soul, and beauty that connects us all. Lyrical compositions of color and light transcribe the visible and invisible, the unseen, the other, the divine in all things. The artist's painting surfaces of reclaimed metals (aluminum, steel, or copper) forged from the earth's crust combined with her subject matter—clouds, water, and the outer expanses of our universe—speak to balance, unity, and inclusion of the sacred feminine. Nichols' work is in international collections including those of a former FBI director, a U.S congressman, Yale Medical, and the Vatican. Her paintings have appeared as scenic design for the CBS news show, "Face the Nation." Archival prints (mounted on copper) of her works, Phi and Juno, are installed in the Vatican Observatory Museum in a gallery dedicated to astronomical art. Clare Gallery's Divine Cosmos exhibition will include both original paintings, Phi and Juno.

We are called to be stewards of God's creation. Have you noticed that things are not as they should be? Materials that were considered "wonder products" are now being found to cause us direct harm. Plastic has been found to be one of these culprits. Shouldn't we do something to protect ourselves and our families? Let's start with single use plastic.

Right now you can start reducing your dependency on single use plastic items. Some of the following items have readily available substitutes:

Disposable plastic water bottles

Disposable plastic coffee and tea cups and lids

Disposable plastic food containers

Disposable plastic food utensils

We have been lead to believe that disposable plastic items can be easily recycled, but this is not the case. Only about 9% of recyclable plastic is actually recycled. The rest end up in landfills and oceans around the world. We all just need to make an effort to find and choose substitutes.

Franciscan Center for Urban Ministry Receives \$7,500 in Funding from Archbishop's Annual Appeal

Since 1981, the Archbishop's Annual Appeal has assisted countless people – regardless of race, religion, or color – across the Archdiocese of Hartford with health care, education, housing, emergency expenses, and in numerous other areas.

This year, the Franciscan Center for Urban Ministry received a check in the amount of \$7,500 from the Archbishop's Annual Appeal.

This grant will be used directly to continue the work for which we are called—to feed the hungry, to offer comfort to the weary, and to serve all who come to our doors seeking nourishment, both of body and spirit. Specifically, this funding will help us feed the hungry who come to our doors for dinner 365 days of the year.

We are in "challenging times when homelessness continues to rise in Hartford for the third consecutive year," says Fr. Mike Johnson, O.F.M., Executive Director of the Franciscan Center for Urban Ministry, "the increasing costs of rent, electricity, and food have pushed many into severe food insecurity. Even those who remain housed struggle to meet the basic needs of daily life." The Franciscan Center serves dinner 365 days a year, and has experienced a sharp increase in the number of meals provided, for example, in September 2024, we served over 1,000 more meals than in the same month last year.

\$1,500 of those funds was earmarked for Catherine's Place where we continue to provide transitional housing for men in the Open Hearth Program.

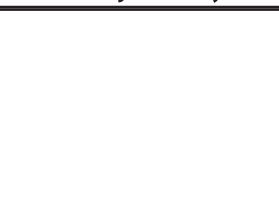
