The Pastor's Corner

#### December 22, 2024

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

I arrived home on Thursday, December 12th

after a whirlwind tour of several cities in Europe, including Strasbourg and Colmar, France; Cologne, Germany; and Brussels, Ghent and Bruges, Belgium. I brought with me some wonderful memories and photos of the places I'd seen as well as a doozy of a head cold!

One particular memory is that of Strasbourg's immense and impressive cathedral: Notre-Dame de Strasbourg, built between 1015 and 1439. Its 466-foot tower can be seen from many parts of the "Grande Île," and is a helpful guide-post in case you get lost, which is easy to do in this ancient medieval city!

Most of the churches I saw during my travels already had their nativity scenes in place, including Strasbourg Cathedral. However, its nativity scene was one of five different scenes depicting the various moments of the Gospel Infancy narratives, including the Annunciation, Visitation, Birth of Jesus, Visit of the Magi, and the Presentation in the Temple. This is a photo of the Visitation of Mary to her cousin Elizabeth:



Here we see two women, pregnant with their offspring, greeting each other with joy and motherly anticipation. Both Mary and Elizabeth were undergoing surprise and confusion over the mysterious ways of God: Elizabeth for the many years she and her husband Zechariah had prayed for offspring; Mary for the fact that she had conceived a child through the power of the Holy Spirit who would be the Son of the Most High. The Gospel of Luke records their trusting and faith-filled responses: "Thus the Lord has done for me in the days when he looked on me, to take away my reproach among people" (Elizabeth); "Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word," (Mary).

For both women, their trust in God would find fulfillment in the birth of their sons, John and Jesus. An older woman's apparent barreness would result in a child who would be the last prophet to herald the coming of the Messiah, the son of her younger cousin, Mary.

On a more human level, the meeting of a family member, especially one that takes place over a considerable distance, it always a joyful occasion. Such was the case for me when I got together with one of my cousins, Jim, who lives in Cologne with his wife and two adult children and their growing families. I also think of the reunion I enjoyed with some of my cousins back in September who had come to Hartford, along with my brothers and sisters, for the celebration of my 70th birthday and 40th anniversary of ordination.

I think back, also, to the many times when we were growing up, and visits with our cousins at Christmas or during the summer months when we would travel to each other's home cities. I am sure that many of you will be doing the same thing this year as you travel to visit relatives, or they come to visit you to celebrate the Christmas holidays.

I am reminded, as well, that many families around the world will be spending Christmas in much different circumstances as wars continues to separate families, or force them to flee their homelands just to find safety. Let us pray for all those who will spend yet another Christmas apart from their families and loves ones for whatever reason. May they not lose hope that some day they will be reunited and delivered from fear and anxiety of what tomorrow might bring.

May of all of us, in the coming days of Christmas, experience a sense of togetherness in the joy of the birth of Jesus, the Prince of Peace; that the world may know true peace and family unity.

## **Prayer Squares for Peace**

In his December 1st Pastor's Column in the bulletin, Father Tim wrote:

"It seems that, for the past several years, Advent has begun under a strange set of circumstances. In 2020 we were still dealing with uncertainties of the pandemic ... Last year Advent began under the cloud of war in the Middle East. This year, we begin Advent with the country preparing for a new Presidential administration. Each of these circumstances have instilled a certain amount of uncertainty in all of us."



Prayer Shawl Ministers often have one response to times of "uncertainty": knit or crochet!

At the height of the Covid pandemic, over

3,000 Prayer Squares were created by our ministers and offered to first-responders, those in hospitals, nursing homes, soup kitchens, etc. with a reassuring prayer for God's accompaniment and support from our faith community.

Small knitted or crocheted colorful squares made with love, sent out with prayer, had quite an impact on both the makers and the receivers.

Now, at the beginning of 2025, the Prayer Shawl Ministry will once again step forward. At the January and February Community Sundays, ministers will be available to teach how to knit or crochet simple squares. The



ministry feels it is the right time to invite parishioners to take and/or to make *Prayers Squares for Peace* and distribute them throughout Lent.

# Religious Education ... Registration is always on our website!



The religious education programs at St. Patrick – St. Anthony Church are designed to allow parents to choose not only the best schedule for their young children but also the best learning format for those children. We firmly believe that the parents (and families) are the original and primary educators of their children, and we are honored to support you in nurturing your child's faith. Our classes begin at age three.

For this reason, religious education for children through sixth grade can occur at St. Patrick — St. Anthony Church within a traditional format, a hands-on (Montessori) format (Catechesis of the Good Shepherd) or a family format (Whole Community Catechesis).

Our middle and high schoolers are very involved in social justice and community service. They host parish wide service projects (i.e. Advent Wreath Workshop and Easter Cookie Delivery), build connections with the homebound of our parish, and volunteer regularly helping set up and working in the hydroponic gardens with LEVO International. Service continues as students enter high school including regular service with House of Bread, No-Freeze Shelter, Franciscan Center Sandwich Ministry and other opportunities with our community partners, and an open invitation to participate in the life of our parish by joining any of our ministries such as the singing in the choir, lectoring, Altar Serving, etc.

# Christmas 2024

My friends, I am pleased to share with you this first Christmas pastoral letter as your Archbishop. Many of you are regular Mass goers. Some of you come occasionally, once a month or so. Some come once or twice a year on the major holidays of Christmas or Easter. For others, this may be the first time you have been in a church for years or maybe even for the first time. To all of you, I say, "Welcome and merry Christmas."

Whatever your relationship with the Church may be, I invite you to consider how the moment of the Incarnation – God becoming man in Jesus Christ – has graced all of creation with the saving power of God. Throughout the course of the Church's history, great saints and poets have authored heartfelt praise to the mystery of the Incarnation in which they tried to capture what it meant that God, the Supreme Creator of all that is, became one like us. Writing in the 4<sup>th</sup> c., St. Gregory Nazianzen came close to offering a perfect blend of the poetic and the theological when he wrote:

"The very Son of God, older than the ages, the invisible, the incomprehensible, the incorporeal, the beginning of beginning, the light of light, the fountain of life and immortality, the image of the archetype, the immovable seal, the perfect likeness, the definition and word of the Father: he it is who comes... ...to take to himself all that is human, except for sin... ...He who makes rich is made poor; he takes on the poverty of my flesh, that I may gain the riches of his divinity. He who is full is made empty; he is emptied for a brief space of his glory, that I may share in his fullness."

But, while St. Gregory's words may transport us into the Mystery of the Divine Majesty of God made manifest, the greeting of the angels to the shepherds that we hear proclaimed in the Gospel of Luke lead us deeply into Christ's humanity:

"Do not be afraid; for behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For today in the city of David a Savior has been born for you who is Christ and Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger."

In this Christmas celebration, we recall the mystery of Christ, true God and true man, and offer thanksgiving that "God so loved the world, that he gave us his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but have eternal life," and remember that every time we celebrate the Mass we encounter the same Christ present among us in the Church gathered, in the Word proclaimed, and in the Sacrament of the Eucharist - and what a Christmas gift that is!
