The Paston's Corner

February 16, 2025

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

"Parting is such sweet sorrow." That famous line from Shakespear's "Romeo and Juliet" comes to mind as I announce that our Director of Music Ministry, Gabriel Löfvall, has been



appointed Director of Music at St. Joseph Cathedral here in Hartford. Gabe's final weekend with us will be March 8-9, and we will have an appropriate farewell for him at the 10:00 Mass on Sunday, March 9, followed by Community Sunday in the Franciscan Center.

Since September of 2009, Gabe has been a force of nature with his musical talents which have made our parish a beacon of wel-

come, drawing many of you to our liturgies and concerts. When I arrived here in 2020 I remember saying that St. Patrick-St. Anthony parish was like a gem among our Province's ministries because of its superb music ministry, much of which is due to the efforts of Gabe. I have enjoyed a very productive and creative collaboration with Gabe over the past few years, which I will miss very much. But his enthusiasm and *joie de vivre* will remain with us always.

I am currently seeking an interim music director to see us through the remainder of the choir season. A search committee is also being formed to guide us through the process of hiring a new director of music. I hope to have someone in place by September. I know that Gabe's departure will be a difficult adjustment in the life of our parish, but we have been through other personnel changes over the past several years, and we have weathered those changes with confidence and hope. Let us give thanks for all the wonderful musical moments and memories which Gabe has given us, and may his ministry at the cathedral bring joy to our entire archdiocese.

In other news, I am pleased to announce that Patti Wawzyniecki has been selected to chair our Sister Parish Committee, succeeding Marc Sherer. Patti has been active in the Sister Parish Committee for a number of years, and has served as co-chair of the annual "Christmas in July" fund raising campaign for the past two years. I am very

grateful to Patti for taking on this important role, especially during this time of great suffering in Haiti from the violence perpetrated by armed gangs. Marc Sherer has led the committee through some crucial moments, including the renewal of the covenant between St. Patrick-St. Anthony and Ste.-Geneviève parishes. Marc is in constant communication with their pastor, Fr. Gaby Noël; and we continue to support the students and teachers at the parish school.

I am also pleased to announce that this year's St. Joseph Medal of Appreciation will be awarded to Pamela Morrison-Wolf on Sunday, March 16, at St. Joseph Cathedral. We nominated Pamela for her years of dedicated service as a Lector at weekend and weekday Masses, Pastoral Care Outreach Minister of the Eucharist to the homebound, Spiritual Director, Catechist for multiple units of Servant Leadership formation's year-long courses, Care Minister assisting bereaved families at the time of a funeral, and Adult Faith Formation facilitator. We are most grateful for Pamela's very generous and multifaceted ministry for our faith community and we congratulate her on this honor!

Finally, I wish to remind you of Fr. Ken Paulli's presentation at this year's Lenten Twilight Retreat: *A Journey Inward in Love so that We Move Outward in Greater Love*. The retreat will be held on Tuesday, March 11 from 5:30 to 8:00 PM. Fr. Ken was with us last year and we are so glad to have him back once again. He will draw upon Pope Francis's recent encyclical, *Dilexit Nos* ("He Loved Us"), to help us enter more deeply into the heart of Christ and the heart of the Gospel. The suggested offering is \$20.00, including dinner. If you wish to attend only the presentation at 6:30, the offering will be \$15.00. The deadline for registration is Friday, March 7. One final thought: I am deeply grateful to everyone who has participated in our parish appeal. We continue to receive gifts which have totaled \$115,223 so far. This amount is a reflection of your commitment to building up our community of faith. I hope to get several projects underway soon, including upgrades of our IT equipment and the church's sound system, replacement of the kneelers, and other necessary repairs and projects.

Protecting the dignity of all: A statement on the drastic changes to U.S. immigration law and policy

The Provincial Council of the Franciscan Province of Our Lady of Guadalupe is responding to the changes to U.S. Immigration Law and Policy and to the mass deportations happening across the country. They are asking for a just and compassionate approach in protecting the dignity of all. This response aligns with their year-long Franciscan Synod, which concluded in January, in which they have recommitted themselves to responding to the Gospel's call to care for the needs of the poor, marginalized, vulnerable persons, and our common home.

January 29, 2025

As Catholic Christians in the Franciscan tradition we add our voices to countless other Church and public leaders who are deeply troubled by, and opposed to, the drastic changes to U.S. immigration law and policy contained in the executive orders and proclamations issued by the new administration last week. As we understand them, they seek to effectuate "the largest deportation program in American history," to end refugee resettlement, to revoke humanitarian parole grants and to end birthright citizenship. Such a course of action, we believe, will result in severe and unnecessary negative consequences that will harm the most vulnerable among us.

Our opposition is based in our Judeo-Christian faith tradition which, from the Hebrew Scriptures, through the Christian Scriptures, and down to the most recent papal and Church statements, call us to welcome the stranger and to exercise justice and compassion when responding to those who are vulnerable. Catholic social teaching demands that we recognize that all human beings are created in the image of God and therefore possess an inherent and inalienable dignity and respect. The human rights that flow from the dignity of each human person include the right to migrate in the face of severe violence or desperate poverty.

While we agree that the U.S. immigration system has—for too long—needed significant changes and updating, the direction being taken by the new administration will, we believe, cause more harm than good—such as tearing families apart, moving us toward a police state, sowing fear, chaos and confusion among the many hard-working and law-abiding immigrants who have been part of our communities for so many years, and inviting further demonization of immigrants.

Therefore, with many religious communities in the United States, we urge Congress and the Administration to:

- Oppose mass deportation as the means to achieve needed and effective immigration reform
- Support orderly border management that is humane, proportional and respects the right to seek asylum
- Reject non-emergency immigration enforcement in schools, places of worship, social service agencies and healthcare facilities
- Take action to protect the "dreamers," those brought to the U.S. as children who have lived here most of their lives
- Endorse efforts to protect vulnerable groups through such programs as TPS, DED, humanitarian parole and the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program
- Denounce anti-immigrant rhetoric that has no basis in truth

As a nation, let us choose a path forward that effectively secures our borders, even as it protects the dignity of all who come to our shores, through an immigration system governed by mercy and justice.

Our Lady of Guadalupe,
Bring solace to those across the world forced from their homes
Fleeing poverty, violence, and strife.
Protect them in their tribulations,
Strengthen them as they build new lives,
Fill our aching world with your grace and compassion.

Mother of All,
You see beauty and holiness in each of us:
Open the hearts of those who cannot yet see
The dignity of your children seeking refuge.
Unite us to welcome the stranger in your name,
Grant us the courage to break down walls that divide us,
And guide us as we advocate for justice and peace. AMEN.

OLD PIPE ORGAN FINDS NEW HOME AT PASTORAL CENTER

An old pipe organ that fell silent in Enfield is now living a new life in Bloomfield, where it is captivating Catholic music-lovers once again.

Having served parishioners for many years at St. Adalbert Church in Enfield, the pipe organ is now providing music for the liturgies at St. Thomas Chapel at the Pastoral Center in Bloomfield, where it is being enjoyed by archdiocesan employees and invited guests.

The organ from St. Adalbert Church was built in 1986 by J. W. Walker & Sons, currently located in Devizes, Wilshire, England, and it was installed at St. Adalbert that same year.

"It's rare because Walker only built about eight in America," says Stephan Maier, owner of Stephan Maier Tracker Organs in Orange, Mass., who services organs throughout New England. Maier honed his specialized craft, learning to repair and tune organs in his homeland of Germany.

The organ, which served the St. Adalbert community, became available after the community was merged into St. Jeanne Jugan Parish in 2022 and the church was subsequently closed in 2024.

Maier's work on the organ began last September. "An instrument like this is not like a piano. You can't just roll it into a truck, and then roll it into a new place," Maier says. "You completely dismantle it, and then you completely reassemble it and, in the process, we check all the pieces and we refurbish what needs to be refurbished."

"Every instrument is unique," he adds. Working on each pipe organ is "like building a house."

After reassembly and repairs, Maier's team returned in January to complete the job. "We make some adjustments to the sound of the organ, what we call voicing, the tonal work," he explains, "because that needs to be adjusted to the building now that the organ is at St. Thomas Chapel."

According to the Pipe Organ
Database of the Organ Historical
Society, the pipe organ from St.
Adalbert was built in a traditional
design, with hinged doors that
enclose the keyboards. It is a classic
"mechanical stop action" instrument
with two manuals (keyboards) and 24
stops (knobs that indirectly control
the air flow over the pipes), with draw
knobs in vertical rows and a concave
radiating pedalboard.

Pipe organs produce sound by driving pressurized air through the organ pipes as directed from the keyboard. This organ is known as a "tracker organ" because it uses "trackers," or thin strips of wood, to create a pulling motion that links the key or pedal pressed by the organist to the valve that allows air to flow into the pipes.

"In the genre of pipe organs, there are mechanical organs and organs that are still pipe organs but they have an electric action. This one has a mechanical action path. And therefore, it's called a tracker organ," Maier says. "So, the only electric part in this instrument is actually the blower that generates what we call the wind, or the air pressure for the organ.

"But everything else is strictly mechanical and, in that sense, it is a little more complicated than, say, an electric action organ, where you just have a bunch of wires and contacts and magnets," he explains.

"And essentially this [mechanical] type of organ is what Bach and Mendelssohn played on," Maier notes, "because in those days there wasn't electricity, so it was all mechanical."

HOW TO REPORT AN INCIDENT OF SEXUAL ABUSE TO THE ARCHDIOCESE OF HARTFORD

If you have knowledge or suspect that a minor or vulnerable adult (an adult with an intellectual disability) has been sexually abused, in any manner, by personnel of the Archdiocese of Hartford, you are urged to report this information to:

In addition, you will be asked to follow up in writing with a detailed description of the facts involved in the incident. Specifics of this written report can be found in the <u>Policies and Procedures of the Archdiocese of Hartford Relating to Allegations of Sexual Misconduct Involving Minors and Vulnerable Adults</u>. This document is also available online at <u>www.archdioceseofhartford.org</u>. The Archdiocese of Hartford will report any and all incidents to the proper civil authorities.

Mandated reporters in the State of Connecticut are required by law to report any incident of sexual abuse involving a minor or vulnerable adult. We encourage any Non-Mandated persons to report such incidents to the proper authorities as well. We support your right to do so.
