

The Paston's Corner

April 6, 2025

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

The Provincial Minister of Our Lady of Guadalupe Province, Fr. Larry Hayes, O.F.M., wrote a letter recently in response to the current federal administration's actions which have caused increasing anxiety and anger among many people, not just here in the United States, but across the globe. I would like to share his letter with you.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Peace and all good!

We are living in profoundly unsettled and unsettling times, both in our world and in our country. Many in the United States—and I am sure that this includes a good number of our friars—are aghast at the direction the administration in Washington is furiously pursuing at such a dizzying pace. I know that many are hungering for an alternative vision for our future that resonates with the Gospel and brings light and hope to our times.

Perhaps it was a coincidence, or perhaps it was something more, but on the night of the State of the Union address I found in my email inbox a letter that Pope Francis had released even while he was in Gemelli Hospital recovering from double pneumonia. Entitled "The End of the World? Crises, Responsibilities, Hopes," it is Pope Francis' plea to the Pontifical Academy of Life for a response to what he calls the "polycrisis" in which we are enveloped. In his words, "the dramatic nature of the historical juncture we are currently witnessing, in which wars, climate changes, energy problems, epidemics, the migratory phenomenon and technological innovation converge."

As I read Pope Francis' outline of steps needed to respond to our current "polycrisis," I was seized by the desire to hear Franciscan voices who might "reframe" our present context with a Franciscan interpretive lens and offer concrete suggestions as to how we might respond to the pressing issues of our day as Franciscans.

Thus was born this series of monthly reflections on Franciscan responses to the signs of our times: Franciscan analyses of some of the crises we are facing and suggestions for practical actions that will help us to remain aligned to the



Gospel and to be witnesses of hope and prophets of an alternative future.

What are the needed steps that Pope Francis outlines in his letter?

First, examining with greater attention the way we understand our world and the cosmos, so as to transform consciences and social practices.

Second, profoundly revising the parameters we use to understand anthropology and culture.

Third, avoiding the adoption of utilitarian deregulation and global neoliberalism that can amount to social Darwinism—that the law of the strongest is the only law.

Fourth, considering more deeply the relationship and interdependence among all things, viewing human beings as embedded in and connected with the entire ecosystem of living things.

Fifth, understanding that fullness of life is intrinsically linked to a lived union with others—i.e., in order to become individuals we must be part of a larger "we."

Sixth, appreciating the need for international organizations that provide for the global common good, the elimination of hunger and poverty, and the defense of fundamental human rights.

Letters from Prison: Continuing the Conversation

Community in Action Partners is one of the nation's oldest criminal justice organizations and provides restorative justice services to young people and adults, so they can reenter the community and thrive. Prison Arts was established in 1978 and is the longest running program of its kind in the U.S. Prison Arts advocates for art, artists, and art-making in CT prisons. CPA Prison Arts artists are challenged to engage with their own creative journeys. The program has had a positive impact on the lives of both the incarcerated and the people they touch with their artwork: families, the general population, and targeted audiences. The goal is to encourage a greater understanding of the incarcerated to build more empathy and love in the world.

This Clare Gallery exhibit includes new letters from this year's call for entries — highlighting "Mystery, Mysticism, and Meaning" —along with curated letters from the two prior exhibits in 1995 and 2005.

The combination of letters will continue the conversation of self-examination and self-esteem, once again bringing the talent and creativity of the prison population to the community at large.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd



is a faith formation program where children experience God in a tangible way - through working with their hands using materials made just for them, they are able to nurture their relationship with God from the youngest age of 3. They are given freedom of movement throughout the "atrium" (our prepared environment created just for children), and they are invited to choose to work with materials they have been presented.

Children receive presentations from adults who have been prepared through a Formation Course, which teaches theology, child development, and the pedagogical knowledge to work with children effectively.

The setting is retreat-like, and participants have remarked that the course nourished their faith, improved their parenting, and changed their lives in countless ways. Working in the atrium is NOT required!

HOW TO REPORT AN INCIDENT OF SEXUAL ABUSE TO THE ARCHDIOCESE OF HARTFORD

If you have knowledge or suspect that a minor or vulnerable adult (an adult with an intellectual disability) has been sexually abused, in any manner, by personnel of the Archdiocese of Hartford, you are urged to report this information to:

In addition, you will be asked to follow up in writing with a detailed description of the facts involved in the incident. Specifics of this written report can be found in the <u>Policies and Procedures of the Archdiocese of Hartford Relating to Allegations of Sexual Misconduct Involving Minors and Vulnerable Adults</u>. This document is also available online at <u>www.archdioceseofhartford.org</u>. The Archdiocese of Hartford will report any and all incidents to the proper civil authorities.

Mandated reporters in the State of Connecticut are required by law to report any incident of sexual abuse involving a minor or vulnerable adult. We encourage any Non-Mandated persons to report such incidents to the proper authorities as well. We support your right to do so.

Once a written report of an incident of sexual abuse of a minor or vulnerable adult has been received, an investigation will be undertaken by, or on behalf of, the Archdiocese of Hartford.

Several parishioners of St. Josephine Bakhita Parish in Rocky Hill are participating in meaningful online evening prayer broadcasts through Facebook to stay connected to God and their parish.

"Facebook makes it easy to do," says Father George Couturier, pastor of St. Josephine Bakhita, who leads the evening prayer streams during the week on Facebook. "I just set up my laptop (in the rectory) and aim it at my face."

The priest's broadcasts can be viewed at 5 p.m., Mondays through Fridays, by following facebook.com/saintjosephinebakhita.

Some people join Father Couturier when the broadcasts first air on Facebook; others watch it later in the evening. The broadcasts also include the actual text of the priest's spoken

Father Couturier launched the prayer service on Facebook in March 2020 after public Masses were suspended during the coronavirus pandemic.

"The pandemic hit," he says. "It was the perfect time to do it. We were planning to do something before the pandemic."

After in-person Masses resumed in June 2020

EVENING ONLINE PRAYERS BRING PEOPLE TOGETHER

Father Couturier's online prayer broadcasts had a captive audience.

The parishioners, who make up St. Elizabeth Seton and St. James churches, asked the priest to continue the broadcasts.

"We received positive response," Father Couturier says, adding the prayers have been uplifting for many of the viewers. "Some are shut-ins and some just want to hear a calm voice. It's just an opportunity to pray together."

The online evening prayer broadcasts reach about 200 people consistently, says Lisa Orchen, parish communications coordinator. For many people, she adds, the broadcasts have become an essential part of their own "spiritual routine."

"Couples share that they participate in evening prayer together with Father George leading them every evening," Orchen says. "Similar to daily Mass, evening prayer participants post words of deep appreciation for Father George's nightly ritual consistency and for offering this daily prayer practice for all to follow and join with."

Father Couturier says he prefers to broadcast his daily prayer messages on Facebook in the evening after people have settled in at home from a long day.

"They seem to touch the heart," he says of the broadcasts. "People need to unload, rest and go to sleep. People prefer to go to bed with those prayers in mind."

Currently, Father Couturier's broadcasts include Lenten messages using "Give Us This Day," a prayer resource that aids in fostering a deeper connection with God. Viewing spikes for the broadcasts usually occur during Lenten and Advent seasons when more people are tuning in.

In addition to the online evening prayer broadcasts, livestreams of Masses take place each Sunday morning from one of the Rocky Hill churches.

"We have strong consistency with our real-time livestream participants," Orchen says. "The majority of these participants are folks who are deeply connected to our parish but are home or assisted living/nursing homebound due to health and age. We also have folks who are longtime parishioners who now live geographically distant for all or part of the year, and stay connected to the parish through the livestream."
