

The Paston's Corner

May 11, 2025

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Happy Mother's Day to all the mothers, grandmothers, godmothers, or those who are like a mother to someone dear to them. May you always be blessed by the Lord and guided by the Blessed Mother in your vocation to nurture your children in wisdom and goodness of heart.

It is appropriate that Mother's Day falls on Good Shepherd Sunday, a day when we reflect on the role of Jesus as someone who cares for each of us and protects us from danger, just as a mother does. When Jesus says in today's Gospel, "My sheep hear my voice," I think of my mother calling me or my brothers and sisters: "Kids, it's supper time!" or "You two — stop fighting!" It seems that every mother in the neighborhood had a unique way of calling their children to come home when the streetlights came on — just like a shepherd.

I wonder if you've ever noticed the pattern that the Scripture readings take during the Easter season. For example, the first reading on Sundays is always from the Acts of the Apostles. Coupled with the weekday readings, we hear virtually the entire book by the time Pentecost arrives.

Most of the Gospel readings come from the Gospel of John, especially the "Last Supper Discourse" which is read in all three years on the 5th, 6th and 7th Sundays of Easter. However, the Gospel on this 4th Sunday is always from the 10th chapter of John: the "Good Shepherd Discourse."

The second readings come from three sources: the first letter of Peter (Year A); the first letter of John (Year B); and the book of Revelation (Year C), which we are hearing this year. In that book, Jesus is referred to as the victorious Lamb who has conquered death and is adored by throngs in heaven.

There is no more dramatic portrayal of this image of the Lamb than the great altarpiece in Ghent, Belgium by the artist Jan van Eyck, entitled "The Adoration of the Mystic Lamb." I wrote about this great work of art in the bulletin late last year, following my trip to Europe in early December. I'd like to mention a few details about this incredible masterpiece which brings to life the images we read about in the book of Revelation.

The Ghent Altarpiece resides in St. Bavo Cathedral where it was first placed in 1432. Over the centuries, it has withstood several robberies which nearly caused it

to be destroyed. Fortunately, it has survived the ravages of war and theft. Only one panel, the one in the lower left, stolen in 1934, has never been recovered, and was replaced by a very good copy of the original.



The photo above, below, and on the cover of this bulletin, were taken on my iPhone, along with many others to capture the incredible detail to be found in van Eyck's masterpiece.



Seeing this majestic work up close is truly a religious experience, one for which I am very grateful. It is amazing to think how an artist can produce something as extraordinary as this. We must be thankful that God bestows upon human beings this great gift to visualize the truths of our faith with such beauty and imagination.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd

is a faith formation program where children experience God in a tangible way - through working with their hands using materials made just for them, they are able to nurture their relationship with God from the youngest age of 3. They are given freedom of movement throughout the "atrium" (our prepared environment created just for children), and they are invited to choose to work with materials they have been presented.

Children receive presentations from adults who have been prepared through a Formation Course, which teaches theology, child development, and the pedagogical knowledge to work with children effectively.



CGS Formation Training is known to be a transformational experience on many levels for those who have participated in a course. The setting is retreat-like, and participants have remarked that the course nourished their faith, improved their parenting, and changed their lives in countless ways. Working in the atrium is NOT required!

Happy Mother's Day!

In the Middle Ages, many people had to travel far from home to earn a living. They became servants where work was available, or they learned a trade from someone who was willing to teach them.

These people were given a special holiday every year. It came on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, on Laetare ("rejoice") Sunday. In the liturgy on this day, the city of Jerusalem is called our mother. We rejoice because when Easter arrives we will be reunited with mother Jerusalem.

Laetare Sunday came to be called Mothering Sunday. On this day people would go home to their mothers. Many family reunions were held. People were excused from the lenten fast on that day.

The Mother's Day we celebrate in May was started in the early twentieth century by an American woman named Anna Jarvis. After her mother died, she suggested that a memorial service be held in church to honor all mothers. The first such service was held in a Philadelphia church in 1908. Those who attended were asked to wear white carnations in memory of their mothers.

People were so taken with the observance of such a day that in 1914 Congress proclaimed the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day. Other countries adopted the idea. In England they restored the old custom of Mothering Sunday in Lent.

Loving God, as a mother gives life and nourishment to her children, so you watch over your Church.

Bless our mothers,

that they may be strengthened in their vocation. Let the example of their faith and love shine forth. Grant that we, their children, may honor them always with a spirit of profound respect.

Chrough Christ our Lord. Amen.

GALLERY IN NEW HAVEN FEATURES ARTIFACTS ABOUT PONTIFICATES,

INCLUDING POPE FRANCIS

The Blessed Michael McGivney
Pilgrimage Center in New Haven is
welcoming visitors to view a permanent
gallery that highlights the relationship
between the Knights of Columbus, Pope
Francis and other pontificates.

Called the Papal Gallery, the space consists of an array of artwork, archival materials, artifacts, commemorative papal medallions, Vatican correspondence and photographs. These items recount the relationship between the Vatican, popes and the Knights of Columbus during the organization's 143-year history.

In addition, artifacts on display in the Papal Gallery feature items that were presented to the Knights of Columbus during the 12 years of Pope Francis' pontificate.

They include: an apostolic letter, a papal brief, a letter and holy cards to Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly, and a book published to mark the first anniversary of the pope's "Urbi et Orbi" blessing to Rome and the world in an empty St. Peter's Square as the coronavirus pandemic swept the world.

"The Knights of Columbus has enjoyed a close relationship with the Holy See since almost its existence," says Peter Sonski, manager of education and outreach for the Blessed Michael McGivney Pilgrimage Center.

Portraits of all the popes, including Pope Francis who died on April 21, grace the walls inside the Papal Gallery.

Pope Francis played a significant role in advancing the cause of sainthood for Blessed Michael J. McGivney, a parish priest from New Haven who is being considered for sainthood.

In 1882, Blessed McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus to serve the needs of a largely immigrant Catholic community. He died in 1890 of pneumonia when he was 38 years old.

Blessed McGivney moved a step closer to possible sainthood after Pope Francis approved a miracle attributed to his intercession in May 2020. He was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020, at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Hartford.

Located at 1 State St., in New Haven, the Blessed Michael McGivney Pilgrimage Center welcomes visitors Wednesdays through Sundays, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. There is free admission and parking in the lot beneath the building. For more information, call 203.865.0400 or visit
