It has been said that Haitians are very reluctant to trust outsiders. Over the years of Haiti's history many promises were made but very few were kept. Twenty years ago, the parishioners of St. Patrick - St. Anthony joined

in a covenant relationship with the parishioners of St. Genevieve. We committed to help support the parish school by paying teacher salaries and providing a nutritious lunch for the students. That commitment has been kept. The school persevered even during times of floods, tropical storms, earthquakes, and political and social unrest. The teachers have always received their pay. Since 2005 several hundred thousand lunches have been served to the students. The teachers, students, and parents of St. Genevieve school thank the parishioners of St. Patrick - St. Anthony for their generous support and commitment during the past 20 years.



Several years ago, a New York Times reporter visited Haiti to report on the youth. He asked young Haitians to suggest the best way for outsiders to help the young people of Haiti. One young woman told him 'Give us a good education. We can take care of the rest.' We, the parishioners of St. Patrick - St. Anthony, are their hope. They, the parishioners of St. Genevieve Church, are our salvation.

The Pastor's Corner

July 6, 2025

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Freedom. Liberty. Democracy. Opportunity. Self-determination. These are values and principles that we as citizens of the United States hold dear. For almost two-and-a-half centuries we have defended them through times of war and peace. I doubt that anyone living today would ever have imagined how fragile they have become. Independence Day in 2025 has become an occasion for us to reflect on whether or not we will reach our nation's semiquincentennial one year from now.

Recently I read a letter from a pastor of a church in Rhode Island given to the friars by one of our parishioners. In the letter, he said what many pastors are feeling but are reluctant to state publicly. He spoke out about the detentions being carried out in various parts of the country by ICE, forcing undocumented migrants to be deported, separated from their families, spouses and children. The pastor said that he is outraged and heartbroken, feeling helpless watching people suffer because our leaders refuse to lead.

He closed with these words: "I pray for courage – ours and theirs. I pray for a country where laws are just, mercy is not a weakness, and our systems serve the people with dignity. May we never grow

numb. May we never grow silent. May we always speak for those who cannot."



We are a parish that upholds the dignity and human rights of all persons, both near and far. I offer my thanks and support for all the positive things you do to help our brothers and sisters to live in peace and security. This is what we are called to do as Christian citizens.

I would also like to say a few words about our "Christmas in July" campaign that starts this weekend and will continue for the next several weeks. This mid-year campaign has been a tremendous source of funding for our Sister Parish in Zorange, Haiti. In addition to supporting the hot meal program for the students of Ste. Geneviève School and the teachers' salaries, we also have begun to provide funds to assist some of the senior members of the parish. I hope you will participate in our "Christmas in July" campaign by taking one of the attractive ornaments from the tree set up in the church and make a generous gift to our brothers and sisters of Ste. Geneviève.

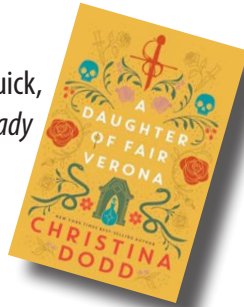

The Leadership Conference of Women Religious (LCWR) is an association of the leaders of congregations of Catholic women religious in the United States. The conference has nearly 1270 members, who represent approximately 66 percent of the 35,000 women religious in the United States. Founded in 1956, the conference assists its members to collaboratively carry out their service of leadership to further the mission of the Gospel in today's world.

The statement which LCWR published in January responds to the difficult and challenging realities of today. The statement witnesses to the convictions of faith and the advocacy to which Sisters have committed themselves. Here is the final section from the LCWR's Statement for your own reflection.

We are now facing a time that differs in many significant ways from any previous period in which most of us have lived. Lives all around us are at stake. All evidence shows that we will be seeing an increase in moral violations.

In the time ahead, we will need to be women who stay informed, listen carefully to all voices and perspectives, and engage in serious and deep discernment to make wise choices so that we do not contribute hatred, fear, division, or violence to the world. Our decisions should lead us to become even more fully who we are called to be – bearers of love who refuse to relinquish our moral authority nor languish in despair. May we wholeheartedly embrace the call of the church to be people of hope and live this call with all our being for the sake of the world and its future.

HOW TO REPORT AN INCIDENT OF SEXUAL ABUSE TO THE ARCHDIOCESE OF HARTFORD

If you have knowledge or suspect that a minor or vulnerable adult (an adult with an intellectual disability) has been sexually abused, in any manner, by personnel of the Archdiocese of Hartford, you are urged to report this information to:

In addition, you will be asked to follow up in writing with a detailed description of the facts involved in the incident. Specifics of this written report can be found in the [Policies and Procedures of the Archdiocese of Hartford Relating to Allegations of Sexual Misconduct Involving Minors and Vulnerable Adults](#). This document is also available online at www.archdioceseofhartford.org. The Archdiocese of Hartford will report any and all incidents to the proper civil authorities.

Mandated reporters in the State of Connecticut are required by law to report any incident of sexual abuse involving a minor or vulnerable adult. We encourage any Non-Mandated persons to report such incidents to the proper authorities as well. We support your right to do so.

Department of Social Services for the Elderly

Once a written report of an incident of sexual abuse of a minor or vulnerable adult has been received, an investigation will be undertaken by, or on behalf of, the Archdiocese of Hartford.

TWO NEW PRIESTS ARE ORDAINED FOR THE ARCHDIOCESE IN 2025

The Cathedral of St. Joseph in Hartford was the site of great joy as Archbishop Christopher J. Coyne ordained two new priests on June 21 for the Archdiocese of Hartford.

The new priests, Father Martin Chouinard and Father Mitchell Kendrioski, were surrounded by the love and support of family, friends, clergy and religious, all of whom shared in the joy of this special day.

More than 100 priests, deacons and seminarians attended the solemn ordination. The priests concelebrated and shared the Kiss of Peace, welcoming the two new priests as clergy.

In his homily, Archbishop Coyne told the new priests they will have a three-fold mission: teacher, priest and shepherd.

“Allow Sacred Scripture to become your book of life,” Archbishop Coyne advised. “Look to Jesus as an example in all situations,” he suggested.

“Know what he said and did, and help others to come to know him and love him. Always allow it to be less about you, and more about him.”

In one of the most moving moments, the two candidates lay prostrate on the Cathedral floor as cantors led attendees in reciting the Litany of Supplication, praying for the saints’ intercession. Other high points included Archbishop Coyne calling forth the Holy Spirit to bless the two men, and the laying on of hands.

After the ceremony, the two newly ordained priests posed for photos with Archbishop Coyne and their families.

“I’m very proud of him,” said Michele Kendrioski, Father Kendrioski’s mother. “As a mother, I know in my heart that he has the right vocation.”

Florence Keszycycki, Father Kendrioski’s grandmother, was also in attendance. “It was a wonderful experience,” she said of the ordination ceremony. “He is so happy. And if he’s happy, I’m happy.”

“I just feel the joy welling up in me,” said Elaine Chouinard, Father Chouinard’s mother.

“Praying to the saints, while they were giving their lives to God, was so meaningful.”


As part of a long-standing tradition, and a source of great pride for parishes that produce vocations to the priesthood, the day after the ordination the new priests offered their first Masses at their home parishes, where they were brought up in the faith.

Father Chouinard celebrated his first Mass at St. Francis of Assisi Church in Naugatuck. Father Kendrioski celebrated his first Mass at St. Thérèse Church, part of St. John Bosco Parish in Branford.

As for their future assignments, Father Chouinard has been assigned to serve as parochial vicar for St. Thomas and St. Timothy Parish in West Hartford. Father Kendrioski will be serving as parochial vicar for Blessed Michael McGivney Parish in New Haven.
